

Preserving and Sharing Redmond's History

Progress Update – April 2013

Planning staff work with property owners, the community, Redmond Historical Society, and other City departments to continue and enhance the Historic Preservation program, which helps provide citizens a sense of shared history. The table below describes the type of actions taken since the last progress update, as well as specific progress made within each category.

Technical Assistance to Property Owners	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Continued to provide technical assistance to property owners and staff, including building maintenance at the Conrad Olsen Farmstead, as necessary. • Staffed the review of a Level II Certificate of Appropriateness regarding the rehabilitation of the Haida House roof, as well as the associated 4Culture Landmark Rehabilitation grant. • Continue to work with the owners of the O.A. Wiley House (Stone House) concerning the City's planned removal of the four American Elms located at the front of the property along Cleveland Street and coordinate the frontage of this site with the Cleveland Streetscape project taking place from 160th Avenue NE to 164th Avenue NE.
